## The I.L.O.

The International Labour Organisation is an intergovernmental agency, of which 79 countries are members. Representatives of governments, of management and of labour organisations participate in its work. It was established in 1919 and entered into relationship with the United Nations as a specialised agency in 1946.

Its purpose is to promote social justice in all the countries of the world. To this end it collects and disseminates information about labour and social conditions, formulates international standards and supervises their national application. It also engages in operational activities and provides technical assistance in carrying out social and economic development programmes.

The machinery of the Organisation consists of—

**The International Labour Conference**, which is the supreme body of the Organisation. It constitutes a world forum for labour and social questions. National delegations to the annual meetings comprise four delegates, two representing the government, one representing management, and one representing labour; each delegate speaks and votes independently, so that all points of view find full expression.

**The Governing Body**, composed of twenty government representatives, ten representatives of management and ten representatives of labour, which is the executive council of the Organisation.

**The International Labour Office**, which acts as a secretariat, an operational headquarters, a world information centre and a publishing house. It is staffed by experts drawn from many different countries, whose knowledge, experience and advice are available to all nations which are Members of the Organisation. It has branch offices and correspondents in many countries.

The Conference adopts international labour standards, which are formulated in special international treaties called *Conventions*, and in *Recommendations*. These are based on careful fact-finding and discussion. As a two-thirds majority of the Conference is required for their adoption they represent the general agreement of informed world opinion. The decisions of the Conference are not automatically binding, but governments must submit the Conference standards to their national legislatures. When the legislature accepts a Convention the government is bound to apply it.

On the operational side the I.L.O. provides governments with expert advice and technical assistance in matters connected with labour and social policy. For this purpose it has established in various parts of the world field offices which serve as centres for assistance to governments in such matters as building up employment services, increasing productivity, the development of training facilities and the administration of social-security programmes. The I.L.O. participates in operating the United Nations Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance.

The work of the Organisation also includes the holding of regional conferences, sessions of Industrial Committees to discuss the problems of particular industries on an international basis, and a variety of specialised technical meetings.

All these activities are closely co-ordinated with a view to fulfilment of the purpose for which the International Labour Organisation was created—the promotion of social justice and peace.

## INDUSTRY AND LABOUR

*Industry and Labour* (formerly *Industrial and Labour Information*, published weekly from 1920 to the middle of 1940 and incorporated in the monthly *International Labour Review* from 1940 to 1948) has been published in English, French and Spanish twice a month since the beginning of 1949.

It keeps the reader informed of the activities of the International Labour Organisation, and more particularly of the proceedings of the International Labour Conference, the Governing Body of the International Labour Office, the various Industrial Committees and the many regional and other conferences and meetings held under the auspices of the Organisation to consider particular problems. Short accounts are given of the contents of current Office publications, and of the progress of international labour standards.

In addition, recent economic and social developments and legislation in all parts of the world are reported in factual articles prepared by the technical services of the Office and based on information derived from official and other sources in the countries concerned.

## LEGISLATIVE SERIES

The most important laws and regulations on labour and related matters in all parts of the world have been published in English and French since 1920 and in Spanish since 1948 in a collection known as the *Legislative Series*. The enactments selected for inclusion deal with contracts of employment, hours of work, leave, women and young workers, employment services, wage-fixing machinery, trade unions, collective bargaining, social security schemes, co-operatives, etc.

The translations or original texts are printed in brochure form so that they may be grouped by subject or country in a loose-leaf binder, and are issued in batches of about 200 pages every second month. Each instalment also contains a list of recent labour legislation giving the titles and sources of the more important enactments received by the International Labour Office during the past two months.

## OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH

Published in English, French and Spanish, this periodical (formerly *Industrial Safety Survey*) is devoted to the protection of workers against accidents and occupational diseases, special emphasis being given to the medical and engineering aspects of the problem. Before 1951 its subject matter was confined to the field of accident prevention, but in that year its scope was extended to include medical matters. The change in the title from "industrial" to "occupational" has been made to indicate more clearly that the periodical is concerned with safety and health in all places of employment and not merely in industry in the narrowest sense.

The articles published in *Occupational Safety and Health* are classified under four heads: leading articles; reports and activities; laws, regulations and standards; and a bibliography covering a large number of books and periodicals.

## REPORTS OF THE INTERNATIONAL LABOUR ORGANISATION TO THE UNITED NATIONS

By virtue of article V (2) (a) of the Agreement between the United Nations and the International Labour Organisation of 30 May 1946, the International Labour Organisation has agreed to transmit to the United Nations regular reports on the activities of the Organisation. These have been issued annually since 1947 and have included a full account of the action taken by the International Labour Organisation in pursuance of the Agreement, together with such information concerning the general activities of the Organisation as appeared to be of interest to the United Nations. Among the topics covered have been manpower problems, employment and productivity, wages, social security, freedom of association and labour-management relations, co-operation, agriculture, maritime labour, salaried and professional workers, industrial committees, protection of children and young workers, women's employment, technical assistance, problems of under-

developed regions and of special occupations, and the publications of the Office.<sup>1</sup>

## OFFICIAL BULLETIN

The *Official Bulletin*, published in English, French and Spanish, is the channel through which the International Labour Office supplies official information on matters connected with the life and work of the International Labour Organisation. The *Official Bulletin* is confined to such documents and information as are essential to a complete and permanent official record of the history of the Organisation and its work. It appears as occasion demands, and has been published since September 1920 in English and French. The Spanish edition has been issued since 1951.

## MINUTES OF THE GOVERNING BODY

The Governing Body of the International Labour Office, which is composed of representatives of governments, employers and workers, meets as a rule three times a year. It supervises the work of the I.L.O., decides the main lines of the policy to be followed, and fixes the agenda of the International Labour Conference.

The minutes contain a full account of the discussions of the Governing Body, as well as the decisions taken. They thus show not merely what is the policy of the I.L.O. at any given time on the most important labour and social questions of the day, but also how that policy was worked out by discussion among the three groups—Government, Employers and Workers.

The appendices to the minutes contain the documents on which the Governing Body's decisions are based. They include the reports of the various committees of experts set up by the Governing Body to deal with particular aspects of the work and the Director-General's Report containing a review of the progress of the work of the Organisation since the last session of the Governing Body.

The minutes are published in English, French and Spanish; the Spanish edition begins with the 114th (1951) Session of the Governing Body.

## DOCUMENTS OF THE INTERNATIONAL LABOUR CONFERENCE

Since 1944 certain changes have been made in the procedure employed for the discussion of proposals for the adoption of international Conventions or Recommendations and there have been corresponding changes in the number and the form of the reports prepared by the Office which relate to such items on the Conference agenda. Under the present procedure most of these reports go through the following stages:

- I. **Preliminary Report and Questionnaire.** The International Labour Office submits to the governments of the States Members of the International Labour Organisation a preliminary report setting out the law and practice in the different countries and any other useful information, together with a questionnaire. (The questionnaire was formerly published after discussion of the preliminary report in the Conference.)
- II. **Further Report (Replies of Governments).** The Office submits to the Conference the preliminary report referred to above together with a further report drawn up on the basis of the replies from the governments to the questionnaire, indicating the principal questions which require consideration by the Conference.
- III. **Proposed Texts Referred to Governments.** On the basis of the replies from the governments to the questionnaire and the first discussion by the Conference the Office submits to the governments one or more Conventions or Recommendations.
- IV. **Amended Texts Submitted to the Conference.** On the basis of the observations of the governments on the third report the Office draws up a final report containing the texts of Conventions or Recommendations with any necessary amendments. This report is submitted to the governments for discussion at the Conference.

In certain cases the procedure is accelerated and questions are dealt with by a single discussion at one session of the Conference. In this event only the first and last of these reports appear.

The other Conference documents which are offered to the public are the following:

**Report of the Director-General.** The annual *Report of the Director-General* of the I.L.O. is an account of the progress of the Organisation during the year under review in relation to the world economic situation and national and international developments in the field of social policy. In recent years a particular theme—e.g. productivity, housing, labour-management relations—has been put forward for discussion by the Conference. In 1957 the *Report of the Director-General* was published in two parts. The first part dealt with automation; the second part reviewed the activities of the I.L.O. during the period 1956-57 and constituted at the same time the eleventh report of the International Labour Organisation to the United Nations.

**Financial and Budgetary Questions.** Contains the budget of the International Labour Organisation with explanatory notes and other relevant documents,

**Information and Reports on the Application of Conventions and Recommendations.** A series of four reports which contain respectively a summary of the annual reports required from governments on the application of ratified Conventions, a summary of reports on the extent to which effect is given to unratified Conventions and to Recommendations, information on the steps taken by the different governments to place Conventions and Recommendations recently adopted before the competent legislative authority in each country and the report of the Committee of Experts which scrutinises the reports received from governments, particularly with a view to ensuring scrupulous application of ratified Conventions.

Until 1950, a single report (which dealt only with the application of Conventions) was prepared for this item on the agenda. The report of the Committee of Experts was contained in an appendix to this report.

**Special Reports on the Working of Conventions.** These are presented to the Conference by the Governing Body at irregular intervals (at the expiration of a period, usually ten years, from the date on which the various Conventions came into force). In the list below they are given after the documents relating to the session to which they are presented. These reports have not been published since 1951.

**Record of Proceedings of the Conference.** The *Record* contains a list of the items on the agenda, lists of members of delegations, committees and the secretariat of the Conference, the verbatim record of speeches made in plenary sittings, bilingual authentic texts of Conventions and Recommendations adopted, resolutions and other decisions, and the reports of the different Conference committees.

All Conference documents are published in English, French and Spanish.

For the 39th Session the *Report of the Director-General* and abbreviated reports containing the proposed texts and points for discussion on the technical items of the agenda were published in German and Russian. Beginning with the 40th Session the *Report of the Director-General* and the reports on the technical items on the agenda are being published in full in German and Russian.

## THE INTERNATIONAL LABOUR CODE 1951

This new edition of the *Code* follows very closely the lines laid down for the first edition but contains more than twice as much matter.

The first volume includes the codified text of the Conventions and Recommendations so far adopted by the International Labour Conference, with very full annotations showing the extent to which the various Conventions are in force and giving digests of interpretations of the text and bibliographical references to the publications of the I.L.O.; there are also general explanatory notes and comparative notes drawing attention to relationships between different provisions. A new preface explains the nature of the Conventions and Recommendations and reviews the experience of more than 30 years' working of the machinery.

The second volume consists of the appendices, which present a selection of texts relating to standards of social policy (other than the Conventions and Recommendations) formulated by the International Labour Conference, by technical conferences and committees, by Industrial Committees and analogous bodies, by Regional Conferences and, in a few cases, by other organisations in co-operation with the I.L.O.

There are three indexes covering respectively interpretations and judicial and quasi-judicial decisions, the principal comparative notes and the principal bibliographical notes.

The *Code* has been published in English, French and Spanish; the Spanish edition covers the period 1919-55.
