Biography

GAETANO MARTINO

President, European Parliament

Gaetano Martino has been associated with the European Parliament for five years. He first became a member in 1957 when the Community's legislative body was known as the Common Assembly. He retained his membership in 1958 when it became the European Parliament and has been twice elected its president -- in March 1962 and 1963.

Mr. Martino, born on November 25, 1900, at Messine, Italy, holds a doctorate in human physiology. He is a professor at Rome University and served as rector of the University of Messine from 1943 to 1957. He is the president of both the Italian Society for Scientific Progress and the Academia Peloritana. Mr. Martino is also a member of the National Academy of XL (a society of Italians renowned in science and letters).

From 1948 to 1954, Mr. Martino was vice president of the Italian chamber of deputies and president of its commission of public instruction. In 1954, he became minister of public instruction and foreign affairs (remaining in the latter post until 1957).

Mr. Martino was president of the Italian delegation at the fifteenth session of the United Nations and serves on the International Disarmament Commission. He is president of the Italian Liberal party and a deputy in the Italian Parliament.

## THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT

The European Parliament officially came into existence in March 1958. But it first took form as the Common Assembly, in April 1951, with the signing of the Treaty of Paris establishing the European Coal and Steel Community. When the Common Market and Euratom were established, a convention was signed in March 1957 transferring the powers of the ECSC Common Assembly to a single legislative body serving all three Communities.

Now called the European Parliament, its members are appointed by and from the national parliaments of the Six. France, Germany, and Italy each have 36 delegates, Belgium and the Netherlands 14, Luxembourg six -- 141 members in all. It meets in Strasbourg.

In the Parliament the members sit by party -- the Christian Democrats, the Liberals and the Socialists -- and not by country, carrying out one of the first decisions of the former Common Assembly. At present, the Parliament's actual powers, granted by the Treaties, are largely consultative. However, the three Executives must report annually to the Parliament, which can oust them by a motion of censure, voted by a two-thirds majority.

Each year the Parliament elects a president and eight vice presidents. The mainspring of the Parliament's influence is in its standing committees. These are 13 committees, whose areas are: political affairs, external trade, agriculture, social affairs, internal market, economic and financial affairs, relations with underdeveloped countries, transport, energy, research and cultural affairs, health protection, administration and budget, and legal affairs.

Every member of the Parliament is a member of at least one of the committees, sometimes of several. The committees may meet at any time.

The committee system allows small groups to prepare reports on specific areas of the Community's work -- working documents for the Parliament. The reports are debated and put to the vote in a full session of Parliament. The committees also hold periodic "hearings" with the Community Executives, providing the Community with expert information and advice when needed.

Some of the recent Community policies debated by the Parliament have been:

1. The negotiations for entry of Great Britain into the Common Market.
2. Action on the second convention of association of the African states and Madagascar with the European Economic Community.
3. Definition of EEC relations with Latin America.
4. The state of multi-lateral tariff negotiation preparations in the framework of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT).
5. Development of a common energy policy.

scheduled for employees in 15 states.

Adjourned at 2:00 P.M.

Foreign Affairs Committee approved a \$30 million, two-year authorization for the United States arms control agency.

Judiciary Committee set aside compromise civil rights bill and announced it would vote today on civil rights bill stronger than the one requested by the Administration.
